Cancer Prevention Study-3 (CPS-3) is a grassroots American Cancer Society research study that will significantly increase our understanding of how lifestyle.

significantly increase our understanding of how lifestyle, environment, and behaviors relate to cancer risks. It is the only nationwide study of its kind in the U.S.

The goal is to recruit 300,000 study participants from across the country by December, 2013, with 14,500 of those participants to be from the Midwest Division. Enrollment will take place at multiple venues in division, including at select American Cancer Society Relay For Life events and at partner worksites.

Individuals are eligible to participate if they are willing to make a long-term commitment to the study by filling out questionnaires approximately every two years, are between 30 and 65 years of age, and have never been diagnosed with cancer. It is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to make an impact on this and future generations.

## Making a Difference as a Society Volunteer

Kari Liotta got an early start as an American Cancer Society volunteer. "I was diagnosed with thyroid cancer when I was 16," she said. "I attended my first Relay For Life and fell in love with it. I enjoyed the sense of community it brought me."

At the University of Wisconsin-Madison Kari found out about Colleges Against Cancer and joined as the survivor chair. It was her first real chance to meet and talk with survivors her age.

Since then Kari has had many challenging and interesting opportunities in her work as a volunteer for the American Cancer Society, including being a member of the National Colleges Against Cancer Leadership Team and on the Relay For Life Nationwide Leadership Training Team. She has served as a keynote speaker, trained volunteers and had the chance to expand her professional network. She now serves as co-chair of the Midwest Division Relay Advisory Team.

When asked what advice she would give other American Cancer Society volunteers, Kari has a few tips that have helped her in the past.

"Don't view your volunteer work as a job, or another thing on your plate," she said. "Remind yourself why you're doing it, and use it to recharge batteries. It can be an energizer, not a drain."

How about when things don't quite work out the way you wanted?

"It's easy to be bummed out when you put in a lot of time and something unforeseen happens," she said. "It's important to remember that the hard work you put in work wasn't wasted. You've learned something along the way. Obstacles are a good way for us to reevaluate our priorities and how we go about doing things. Obstacles encourage us to think and work differently."

And how does this busy graduate manage her time?

"Break up your duties, set aside a little time each week," she said. "Recognize how you work best and translate that to your volunteer duties."

## **Team Captains Are Key!**

Our Team Captains are busy people, so it's important that we use our time with them wisely. We need to make Team Captain meetings worth attending - we want them to look forward to them, not dread them! This is our opportunity to give our Team Captains a taste of what Relay will be like, not "just another meeting." They are more than just a way to disseminate information...they are also a way to spread the enthusiasm for our upcoming Relay For Life event!

While using an agenda to stay organized and being mindful of time is important, it's not all there is to think about in planning. Think outside of the box to try to make your meetings both informative and motivatingit's OK and encouraged to mix things up a bit!

Team Captain's meetings are also a great way to recognize teams for their accomplishments leading up to the event; for example: a team reaching its goal, surpassing what it raised last year, and hitting important fundraising milestones. Think about how you can incorporate "Mission Moments" - and educate our volunteers on the mission of the American Cancer Society.

If you're not sure what your Team Captains need or want from the meeting, ask them! Getting feedback not only on what they would like to see at meetings, but also the event, is a wonderful way to empower and further engage our Team Captains. ## **Fundraise Your Way to Relay Success!**

Here are some new fundraising ideas for your team! Remember—any idea can be modified so that it works for you! Be creative!

### **Fundraise At Work:**

- Have a bake sale! Sell items by the slice, by the plate or by the pan! Or offer certificates to provide a dessert once a month for a flat rate!
- Host a potluck lunch! Ask people to bring a dish to pass and charge an amount per plate. Or make a lunch yourself (Lasagna? Baked potato bar? Tacos?) and provide your co-workers with a lunch in exchange for donations.
- Have a purse swap! Ask co-workers to bring in purses or bags they no longer use and charge \$5-10 per bag!
- Have a "Dress Down Day" at work! Ask co-workers for a donation of \$5 to dress in jeans for the day. Official "I dressed in support of Relay For Life" stickers are available from Laura!
- Put a plastic water bottle on your desk and ask your co-workers to donate their change. If you fill a 16-oz bottle with dimes, you've raised \$100!
- If you work in a retail establishment, you can sell paper suns and moons to customers for \$1 and display the cards to show support for Relay!
- Brown Bag It! Invite an American Cancer Society staff member to speak during your lunch hour on a cancer topic. Ask
  your co-workers to contribute the amount that they would have spent going out for lunch to your Relay team.

#### **Fundraise At Home:**

- Host a party! Many at-home sales businesses (such as Pampered Chef, PartyLite, Home Interiors, Tastefully Simple...) will donate the proceeds of a sale to your Relay Team.
- Sell something unique! Make a big batch of salsa and sell it by the jar! Or sell Relay Roast Coffee—available at www.relayroast.com!
- Have a plant sale! Partner with a local greenhouse to get plants at cost and sell them as a living memorial to those who have been diagnosed with cancer. (Especially great around Mother's Day!)
- Flush Out Cancer! Paint a toilet purple and put it in someone's yard with a sign that says it costs \$10 to take it away, \$20 to give it to a friend and \$30 for Toilet Insurance (meaning it will never come back)! (Can also be done with a yard of pink flamingos!)
- Clip Coupons! Partner with several local businesses to create a Relay Coupon Book with great deals! Sell the books for \$5-10 each.
- Put a link to your Relay web site in the signature area of your web site to remind friends and family to donate to your team! And don't forget to link your Facebook site to the RFL website when you register online!

#### **Fundraise With Your Kids:**

- Bus tables for tips! Partner with a local restaurant and have your team volunteer as busboys/girls for a Friday Fish Fry. Put out cups on the tables for Relay donations, and ask the waitstaff to share their tips as they would with the usual bussers.
- Have a mini car wash! Offer to wash windshields of cars going through a local drive-thru for a donation to Relay!
- Organize a "Penny War" at school! Each class brings in pennies, and students can "sabotage" other classes by putting other coins in their jars (deduct the amount of the silver coin from the penny total). Give the winning class a reward!
- Have a Mini-Relay at your child's school! Ask Laura for more information.
- Ask your child's school to have a Hat Day for Relay! For a \$1 donation, students can wear a hat to school for the day. It
  can also be explained to children how sometimes cancer patients need to wear a hat or wig following cancer
  treatments.
- Host a Chili Feed for friends and family! Or, if you're feeling more adventurous, have a special themed dinner party—
  charge guests for a "Mardi Gras" themed evening with food, drinks, and games for a fun night in!
- Work with a local sports team on a "Home Game" fundraiser. Ask donors to contribute a certain amount per shot a team member makes, or a certain amount per point! You could also host a 50/50 raffle at halftime!
- Dance for a cure! Host a school dance to raise money for your Relay team!
- Bark For Life! Host a dog walk so that your four-legged friends can have a Relay of their own!
